Improved Production is one of the fastest growing categories of touring car circuit

produced and
available to the
public in Australia
and then carry out
modifications to

engines, brakes

and suspension



according to the regulations outlined by CAMS for category 3J.

The freedoms produce some very fast racecars from which where once essentially road going vehicles. The variety of cars and the low cost make it a very accessible category, ideal for drivers at all stages of their racing career.

The Cars

One of the best things about Improved Production is the variety. Its the only class where you can see 4s, 6s, V8s, turbos, rotaries, old cars and new racing together.

Improved Production car racing is divided up into two major classes. The "Overs" (over 2000cc) and the "Unders" (under 2000cc).

Cars competing in the "overs" class



range from V8 and
6 cylinder
Commodores,
Monaros and
Falcons to late
model turbo 4WDs
such as WRX STIs
and Mitsubishi

EVOs as well as early model cars such as Mazda rotarys and turbo Escorts.

The "unders" class cars range from Toyota Celicas and Ford Escorts through to late model Honda Civics, Integras and Mirages. The result is a great mix of different touring cars with different levels of development and technologies that generate close and exciting racing.

Affordable Racing

Improved Production cars, while being a relatively inexpensive way of entering circuit racing, can also include some very expensive racing cars. But with the large eligibility of vehicles you will be able to race against others within your skill and budget level.



Currently
competitive early
model "unders"
can be purchased
for around \$12K
whilst later model
Honda Civics and
Mirages can be

brought for around \$15k. As for cars in the "Overs" class, good packages start at around \$16K.

At the other end of the scale, outright State Championship winning cars have recently sold for around \$30K whilst a high quality late model V8 could set you back well over \$50K.

As for running costs, that comes down to the budget of the competitor and the chosen vehicle. As an entry-level, budget on spending



around \$5-10K for a season of racing to cover tyres, fuel, entry fees, maintenance costs plus some development of the car.
